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### **Election Environment**

- Tough election for tax measures in Marin County and statewide
- Historically low passage rates
- Negative advertising on split-roll measure: Even though this measure is scheduled for November, negative advertising during this time period was designed to scare voters about losing their Prop 13 taxpayer protections
- Many voters held on to their ballots due to the presidential primary election

## I. Support for Measure B



### Measure B Results

#### **Overall**

#### Mail Ballot vs Poll

- Measure B fell short of the 2/3 threshold needed for passage
- In order to win, 1,661 NO voters needed to instead vote YES, or an additional 4,983 YES voters needed to turn out and vote
- Measure B passed among polling place voters but not among mail ballot voters

- Polling place and late mail ballot voters were supportive of Measure B and above 66.7% needed for passage
- We expected later voters to be more supportive of Measure B, which held true, yet these voters were the most impacted by increased attention on economic and COVID-19 concerns, which affected support and turnout





 Although Mill Valley was the only city to pass Measure B, precincts within other cities and towns were supportive above the 2/3 level



 Within most cities, support for Measure B was higher among polling place voters than mail ballot voters




## Vote by Mail Results

- 3,030 voters cast ballots in this election but did not vote on Measure B
- Turnout was lower than the projected turnout of 62,000 voters, although the demographics of who voted was relatively consistent with projections

- Democrats made up a significant percentage of ballots cast, due to registration advantage
- Turnout among Democrats was slightly higher than anticipated,
  which was likely due to the Presidential Primary


 Turnout of our supporters was significantly higher than turnout among other voters, due to the campaign's GOTV efforts




## Rate of Ballot Returns & Votes



- By March 2, the day before Election Day, only 20,327 ballots had been returned, which is only half the ballots that were returned by mail
- Many voters held onto their ballots and voted close to Election Day






• This chart displays the rate ballots were returned in the District over the voting period. When the stock market began to drop, the majority of voters had yet to cast their ballots




## Rate of Ballot Returns & Votes by Party



- Voters in all parties held onto their ballots, although a greater percentage of Democrats voted later in the election
- Over 69% of Democratic ballots, 46% of Republican ballots and 64% of DTS ballots were processed or cast on Election Day, indicating that concerns about the economy and Covid-19 were present when they were voting

· Voters of all ages held onto their ballots and voted late in the cycle



## V. Conclusions & Next Steps



## **Findings**

- Due to the Presidential Primary election, many voters held on to their ballots and over 66% of ballots were cast in the final days of the election
- Although turnout was lower than anticipated, the overall makeup of voters was consistent with projections
- Partisan concerns and the split-roll tax impacted voter attitudes throughout the election, with concerns about COVID-19 and the economy rising in the final days
